

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH - CERTIFICATE

The Graduate Certificate in Maternal and Child Health (MCH) develops students' MCH competencies, enabling graduates to improve health service delivery to all mothers, children, and families. This certificate focuses on the foundations of MCH, such as understanding Title V programs, health disparities in MCH, life-course approach and general knowledge about MCH populations and common public health concerns.

This is an interdisciplinary certificate that partners with departments across the Texas A&M School of Public Health, including the School of Education and Human Development and the Bush School of Government and Public Service. This allows the MCH certificate to offer electives in areas ranging from reproductive and perinatal epidemiology to the impact of policy and security on women's health.

This program is approved for delivery on-campus in College Station and via asynchronous distance education technology. While many of the required courses are available via distance education, applicants may need to take one or more courses in person in order to obtain the certificate.
