Graduation requirements include 3 hours of International and Cultural Diversity (https://catalog.tamu.edu/undergraduate/general-information/degree-information/international-cultural-diversity-requirements/) courses and 3 hours of Cultural Discourse (https://catalog.tamu.edu/undergraduate/general-information/degree-information/cultural-discourse-requirements/) courses. A course satisfying a core category, a college/department requirement, or a free elective can be used to satisfy this requirement. The required 6 hours may be met by courses satisfying other areas of a degree program. See your academic advisor for further information.

Up to 6 hours of major degree hours may count toward a minor.

Minor Field of Study

All Global Studies majors are required to select a minor field of study from a department or program within or outside of the College of Arts and Sciences. The minor will consist of a minimum of 15 hours of coursework, as defined by the minor department. Minors may have specific requirements; students should consult undergraduate advisors in these areas of study. A second major may substitute for the minor. A

maximum of 6 hours of courses used to meet the minor requirements may be used in the major.

Foreign Language

Students entering Global Studies take a placement exam to determine the level of and number of required foreign language courses. Exam results may fulfill a maximum of 14 semester credit hours.

- Students placed in 101 will take 101, 102, 201 and 202 and 6 semester credit hours at the 300- or 400-level in the same language.
- Students placed in 102 will take 102, 201 and 202 and 6 semester credit hours at the 300- or 400-level in the same language.
- Students placed in 201 will take 201 and 202 and 6 semester credit hours at the 300- or 400-level in the same language.
- Students placed in 202 will take 202 and 6 semester credit hours at the 300- or 400-level in the same language.
- Students placing out of 101, 102, 201 and 202 will take 6 semester credit hours at the 300- or 400-level in the same language.

International Experience Requirement

The International Experience must generate at least 3 hours of Texas A&M University credit. Departmental approval is required before travel. Any international experience that does not meet these criteria will not count toward the degree.

- Must be at least one long semester or one 10-week summer approved experience.
- · Must be taken after completion of 100-level language requirement.
- Must be completed before student is eligible to enroll in GLST 481 .
- Must be an immersion experience in the foreign culture and language, which can be satisfied by:
 - An internship at a company, government agency or non-profit operation involving significant use of the foreign language. Three hours of GLST 484 elective credit can be given.
 - Courses taken at a foreign university. Courses may count for Texas A&M University credit with approval of the advisor of the relevant department.
 - Selected Texas A&M University Study Abroad programs which involve intensive cultural and language immersion.
 - A combination of the above to equal the requirement of a long semester or a 10-week summer-approved experience.
- · Must be taken outside of the student's country of origin.
